- Entries are limited to 8 single-sided pages and 4MB
- Contest reporting period: March 1, 2026 – February 28, 2027.

Any entry that is submitted non-electronically will need to be sent to the member and senior chairs. If there are multiple chairs, all need to receive a copy. This year, the National Project will partner with the National Park Service to recognize and honor the contributions of youth during the American Revolution. Funds raised through the National Project will support the creation of interactive educational panels in Yorktown that highlight the important but often overlooked role children played in the fight for American independence. These panels will help bring this history to life for visitors as our nation continues the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the United States.

This year's National Theme is "*Liberty's Legacy*." The theme was chosen to recognize the service, leadership, and patriotism demonstrated by the young people of the Revolutionary era while connecting their example to the members of C.A.R. today. Through this project, members are encouraged to explore how youth shaped our nation's founding and how they can continue that legacy within their own communities.

As a National Society, we will work toward the goals of raising \$50,000 for the interactive panel initiative and \$10,000 for the N.S.C.A.R. Operating Fund to help ensure the continued success of our organization. Members are also encouraged to participate in the Leadership Legacy Campaign by completing service hours, leadership development activities, and individual fundraising efforts throughout the year. Program: Learn about and present programs on the important role children played during the American Revolution and how young people contributed to the patriot cause through service, leadership, and sacrifice. Celebrate America 250 with C.A.R. by registering for the Leadership Legacy Campaign.

Suggested program topics may include:

- Young messengers, drummers, nurses, and spies of the Revolution
- Families and children during the Revolutionary War
- The effects of the Revolutionary War on Indigenous children and families

Ideas for possible activities:

1. Participate in the Leadership Legacy Campaign
2. Create a presentation or poster highlighting the role children played during the American Revolution.
3. Host a trivia night, scavenger hunt, or interactive game focused on youth during the Revolutionary era.
4. Visit a local historical site, battlefield, or museum connected to the American Revolution and discuss how young people may have experienced or contributed to events there.
5. Organize a community service project that demonstrates how members can continue *Liberty's Legacy* through leadership and service today.

America 250

Purpose: To commemorate the 250th Anniversary of the United States of America. Members are encouraged to plan and participate in celebrations and programs that mark significant events during the American Revolution.

Program: All societies are encouraged to dive into history between March 1, 1776, and June 30, 1777.

1776:

- June 7, 1776: The Lee Resolution is proposed to the Second Continental Congress
- June 28, 1776: The British begin bombardment of Fort Sullivan in Charleston harbor. Failing to take the Fort, the British retreated to New York.
- July 4, 1776: Congress adopts the Declaration of Independence
- July 8, 1776: The Declaration of Independence is publicly read for the first time in Philadelphia.
- July 9, 1776: Sons of Liberty topple the statue of King George III in Bowling Green, New York City.
- August 27, 1776: Battle of Long Island, NY becomes the largest battle of the Revolutionary War.
- September 19, 1776: The Continental Congress officially names the nation the “United States of America.”
- September 21, 1776: Nathan Hale is captured by British forces while gathering information for the Continental Army.
- October 11, 1776: Battle of Valcour Island is fought on Lake Champlain.
- October 28, 1776: Battle of White Plains, NY.
- December 25–26, 1776: Washington crosses the Delaware River and defeats Hessian forces at the Battle of Trenton, NJ.

1777:

- January 3, 1777: American forces defeat the British at the Battle of Princeton, NJ.
- March 12, 1777: The Continental Congress adopts a flag featuring thirteen stars and thirteen stripes as a naval ensign.
- April 27, 1777: Battle of Ridgefield, CT.

1777, cont.:

- May 14, 1777: British General John Burgoyne begins his campaign south from Canada.
- June 14, 1777: Congress adopts the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States.
- June 30, 1777: American forces continue defensive preparations against British advances in the northern colonies during the Saratoga campaign.

Ideas for possible activities:

1. Attend/organize an event celebrating America 250.
2. Learn about the adoption of the Stars and Stripes and the history of the American flag.
3. Recreate one of the battles from 1776 – 1777 to engage your society in an immersive America 250 experience.
4. Visit in person or virtually historical sites of the American Revolution.
5. Host/attend the planting of a Liberty Tree or gather at a Liberty Tree planted in your area for a society meeting.
6. Record volunteer service hours in collaboration with the America 250 Commission’s “America Gives” initiative.

Guidelines for the 2026-2027 National Merit Award

N.S.C.A.R. recognizes accomplishments, activities, and hard work of the most outstanding societies. **ALL** Gold, Blue, Red and Honorable Mention societies are honored for their achievements. The top three (3) societies are chosen from among Gold Merit Award societies. All societies entering will receive a **Liberty's Legacy** Certificate of Participation.

General Information:

1. You must adhere to the limit of **50 pages**, excluding newsletters, yearbook and a copy of the treasurer's report. Anything beyond the first 50 pages **WILL NOT** be judged.
2. **ALL** pages should be numbered and referenced on the entry form. You may also submit a separate list or table of contents to identify where documentation may be found. The easier it is to find the needed information greatly increases your chances of receiving credit for each requirement.
3. **All responses will be verified with proof provided.** If you don't include documentation, then we do not have it!
4. **One PDF, no larger than 50 Mb if filing electronically**
 - a. File name should be: **SOCIETYNAME_NM_2027.**
 - b. File compression to **50 Mb** is available through **ilovepdf.com** or you can use any other free software to merge files into one PDF and compress to 50 Mb or less.
5. If sending in a hard copy, you must adhere to the **50 page maximum**, section dividers do not count as a page as long as no other information other than the section designation is used.

Return the completed entry form, with required proofs, covering the period from March 1, 2026 to February 28, 2027.

Entries must be sent to both the Member and Senior Chair.

Email entries must be received by 11:59 p.m. in your time zone on March 8, 2027

Hard copy entries sent by U.S.P.S. must be postmarked on or before March 3, 2027

Section A: Programs and Projects

1. Hold at least six (6) business meetings that begin with the opening ritual, that includes the pledge and creeds.
 - a. List the Program(s) covered
 - b. Number of participants (members, prospective members, seniors and guests)
 - c. Provide the meeting date
 - d. Provide photos of any activities related to the program(s) covered.
2. Other events such as parades, wreath laying, service projects where you meet as a society but the ritual is not performed.
 - a. Provide date(s)
 - b. Number of participants (members, prospective members, seniors and guests)
 - c. Description of the event.
 - d. Provide photos of the event, with group or individual photos as appropriate.
3. Have one program or presentation or activity on the National Project.
 - a. Invite the National President to attend, or send a statement about their project and how individual societies can support Liberty's Legacy.
 - b. Be creative and use the National Program Packet for ideas.
4. Send invitations to the National Officers or State Officers to attend one of your events either in person or via Zoom.
 - a. Provide a picture of the invitation
 - b. If no officers can attend and they sent a reply, take a snapshot or screen shot of the reply.
 - c. Officers can attend in person or via Zoom

- d. List the officers, and their titles national or state that attend.
 - e. Take photos or screen shots of attendees.
5. Host a meeting where you invite societies from around the country to attend or attend a meeting you are invited to attend and hosted by another society.
 - a. Publicize the meeting for in person or Zoom participation
 - b. Share any handouts or other documents with those who plan to attend. ie slides or materials beforehand so visiting societies can be prepared.
 - c. Societies who attend another meeting can now earn points for attendance:
 1. Document the date, who hosted, take screen shots if by Zoom or photos if attended in person.
 2. What program was covered
 3. How many members from your society attended
 4. How many seniors from your society attended

Section B: Dues

1. Society dues and the Senior Society Presidents fee **MUST** to be paid by January 1, 2027.
2. Local Societies
 - a. 11 or more families 90% of the families need to pay
 - b. 10 or fewer families all but one family needs to pay
3. Examples: 68 total members from 32 families. Must submit dues for at least 90% of the families. (29 families).

1. Provide a list of new members with their national numbers.

 - b. Select Society Dashboard at the top of the screen
 - c. Locate the new member's section
 - d. Click on [view details](#) and a list of your new members should appear.
 2. Life members can be found in eCAR, membership reports. Life Members. Take a screen shot of this section to show National Number, name and date paid. This will provide you with the total life members and what percentage of your membership are life members.
 3. Do you have members who belong to DAR, SAR or S.R. Start making a list now. You can gain 10 points (1 point for each member that is a dual member of C.A.R. and a parent organization). Junior membership in the SAR counts.
 - a. Provide the name of the current C.A.R. member with their national number
 - b. List the parent organization they are a member of DAR, SAR or S.R. and list their national number.
 4. Based on your total membership what percentage are life members. This information appears on the dashboard and the treasurers report shows all life members.

Section D: The C.A.R. Magazine

1. Submit articles, activities or games to the *C.A.R. Magazine*.
 - a. Articles, activities or games should have first name only of member, age of member and should identify the society.
 - b. Take a screenshot of the submission. You do not have to be published to gain points, you need to submit.
2. Have a "Magazine Minute" at two meetings.
 - a. Take a snapshot of the cover of the magazine.
 - b. Take a snapshot of the actual article being read

- c. Provide publication date of the magazine and the page number where the article appears.
3. At least one member of each household should subscribe to the *C.A.R. Magazine*. This includes immediate family members who are National and Life Promoters, and Seniors who receive the magazine. Use screen shot from society dashboard and add in immediate family members. Seniors who may also receive.

Section E: Communications

1. Promote the National Program to DAR, SAR and S.R. chapters.
 - a. Invite DAR, SAR and S.R. to attend your meetings
 - b. Visit a DAR, SAR or S.R. meeting and bring greetings and tell them about **Liberty's Legacy**.
 - c. Have others take pictures of your presentation
 - d. If there is a program for the event, be sure to take a snapshot of that, especially if your name is listed or C.A.R.is mentioned as being a part of the event.
2. Use nscar.org, local society website, and/or other social media sites promote C.A.R.
 - a. Read the N.S.C.A.R. "**Social Media Policy**", which can be found on the National website.
 - b. Follow the established guidelines to create posts for Facebook, Instagram, and society websites.
3. Utilize various types of media to create public awareness of your society.
 - a. Distribute the C.A.R. Membership brochure or create one for our society to be distributed.
 - b. Publish an article in a local newspaper
 - c. Donate items to local children's hospitals and include a note about C.A.R.
 - d. Participate in community events where you display a C.A.R. sign or wear a C.A.R. t-shirt.
4. Each society newsletter fulfills **ALL** Newsletter Requirements.
 - a. Read carefully the Newsletter requirements in the National Packet.
 - b. Publish the **three** required newsletters for 2026-2027.
 - c. Be sure the National website, National Theme and Project are in each issue after September 1.
 - d. Articles, activities or games must be original and written by members. Provide the authors first name only and age.
5. Society communication. Any form of communication that is sent out for upcoming events, meetings and/or activities.
 - a. Document any newsletter, email, society FB or website communications that announce events, meetings or activities.

Section F: Contests

Contests for **Liberty's Legacy** will provide two options for societies to enter, thus providing more opportunities to support this years' programs and for members to participate. There are two options:

(A) Program in a Box-this option is one that has been created and prepared by national headquarters to meet the requirements and it will have a point value of 1;

(B) Original Program-this option is one the society creates from ideas in the National Packet or members generated ideas that is unique to the society. It will have a point value of 3.

Societies may choose to create all Original Programs or use a combination of Original Programs and Programs in a Box. There are 14 programs in total. If a society uses all Original Programs they can achieve a maximum of 42 points. For each Program in a Box that a society uses, their maximum points will decrease by 2.

Example: The society completes 13 Original Programs and receive 39 points (13 x 3) and 1 Program in a Box (1 x 1) the maximum points the society can receive in this category will be 40.

To complete this section of the National Merit form, check the box under PB for Program in a Box, and you will be awarded 1 point and check the box under OP for Original Program and you will be awarded 3 points. The merit form will automatically calculate your totals for you.

1. The National Presidents Contest is required.
2. Enter as many contests for which the society qualifies
3. **DO NOT** include all of your proof documents submitted for each individual contest. Include a copy of your contest entry form with the Merit Award entry. At a minimum include the name of the contest and details from the contest entry form.
4. Multiple contest entry forms can be inserted into a page. No more than four forms to a page so they can be read.

Section G: Community Impact

This section includes C.A.R. Supported Schools, C.A.R. Day of Service and Community Service. Societies are encouraged to support the C.A.R. Supported Schools. The list of schools can be found in the National Program Packet. Each school has specific needs which can be located on their respective websites.

1. Visit the C.A.R. Supported Schools websites
Choose your form of support from monetary donations to supplies, each school is unique. Document the donation through copies of check, screen shots of donations made electronically. If you receive a donation letter or email, save that for proof that the school received your donation.
2. Did your society participate in the Day of Service on or around April 5, 2026.
 - a. Explain what the society members did
 - b. Provide pictures
3. Did your society have at least one community service project or activity.
 - a. List the date, location and what the project involved
 - b. How many members participated
 - c. Provide photos of the project

Section H: Donations

Local societies are encouraged to make monetary contributions to funds and Star Supporter donations count toward the total (see merit award form). The total amount contributed is up to the Local Society. Be sure to use the Local Society Donation form with submitting your contributions to National Headquarters. **Do not include a donation check with your Merit entry.**

1. Include a copy of the form OR a copy of the Society Donation report, which can be found on eCAR, with your merit entry. All donations will be verified with National Headquarters.

1. Please include the information requested as the Senior National Chair will use this information to:
 - a. Acknowledge receipt of your entry
 - b. Contact the society if a question comes up during the judging process
2. Handwritten information must be printed legibly
3. Signatures can be signed electronically or in printed after member and Senior approve
4. All questions regarding the National Merit Award contest should be directed to the National Chair and Senior National Chair. Contact information is located in the National Roster.

Creating ONE PDF file

1. Create your documents in a program that allows for saving as a PDF file. ie Microsoft Word
2. Newsletters should also be condensed to the smallest PDF file possible.
3. Print to PDF or Save as PDF depending on the software used.
4. Free PDF Tools: ilovepdf.com, adobe.com, smallpdf.com, pdfresizer.com, or any other PDF tool that will compress
5. Drag and drop your PDFs into the online tool but make sure they are in the correct order
6. Once master file is made, check to make sure the file format is: **"SOCIETYNAME" _NM_2027.pdf. Please include full society names, no abbreviations.**
7. In many cases if the file size is still larger than 50 Mb you can use the same website to compress or resize the documents. Make sure the file name is still the same after compression. Pictures may lose some resolution in the compression but words should be readable.

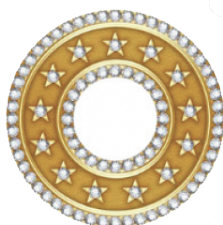

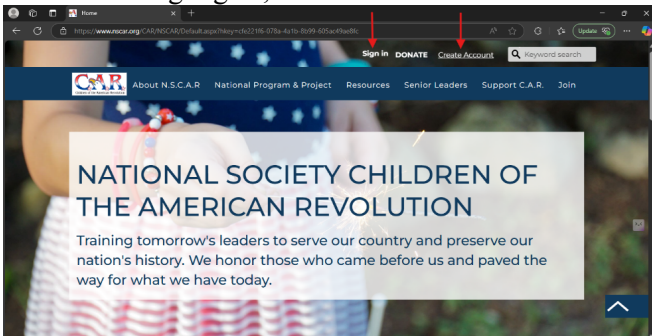
The second thing is to keep email addresses and permissions up to date on the website.

Senior Society President FAQs

- Application guidelines are available on the website under Join > Application and Guidance.
 - We follow these guidelines on every application, and they are sent back or held for correction if they do not follow these. Please ensure that all signatures required (and the member officers if able) are included on all submitted applications.
 - Only the appointed Senior Society President can sign an application, not someone who has unofficially taken over the society.
- Senior Society Presidents are the only appointment at that level that we track, because of the MOA.
 - Each Senior Society President can email hq@nscar.org with the other senior leaders that they want to have eC.A.R. access at the society level.
 - Those people will be given the same term as the Senior State President, so the access ends at the end of the term.
 - Once they are re-appointed or replaced, the state needs to send hq@nscar.org the list again. Most choose the Senior Registrar, Treasurer, and First VP.
- Transfer and resignation requests must either come directly from the member or their parent/guardian, or the Senior Society President can forward their request.
 - There must be proof that the parent/guardian is making the request.
 - Senior Society Presidents cannot transfer or resign members without the family's permission. Those requests are to be emailed or mailed to HQ and members must be in good standing to transfer.
- The forms that are most used by Senior Society Presidents, go to Resources > Forms. About halfway down the page, there is a navy-blue toolbar and one of those tabs is for Senior Society Presidents.

- The \$10 Senior Society President's fee includes a magazine subscription. There is no need to send an extra \$12 unless an additional copy of the magazine is needed.
- Please check the math when submitting the Treasurer's Report with dues, magazine subscriptions and senior fee.
 - Check formulas if using Excel to make sure total column is correct.
- Sometimes people make entries in the dues and magazine columns and forget to total them properly in the total column.
- While C.A.R. National Headquarters does not accept dues and magazine subscriptions payments online, they can complete a credit card form (found on the website) and pay by credit card.
- Use the proper form when calculating Life Member dues (count the number of years being paid to double check). The form indicates that it is to be used by CURRENT members. The calculation is different when submitting applications since the dues for new members admitted after June 30 apply to the next calendar year.
- Review the various reports on the website, such as Rosters and Delinquents.

Due dates for important forms:

- Treasurer's Report & Senior Society President's Fee: January 1, 2027 (Postmarked December 31, 2026)
- Local Society Donation Form: Postmarked by February 28, 2027
- National Contest Entries: March 3, 2027
- Credentials Form: TBD April 2027 (This is required to be sent by every society, even if you have no members attending the National Convention. In the off chance that someone from a society decides to come, and their society did not submit a credentials form, the member would not be eligible to vote).
- Local Society Annual Report: April 1, 2027 (covers the dates March 1, 2026 – February 28, 2027)

Annual DAR Contests

American History Essay Contest

This contest was established to encourage young people to think creatively about our nation's great history and learn about history in a new light. Each academic year, a unique essay topic is chosen, and guidelines are made available. The contest is open to all students in grades 5-8. Essays are judged for historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of materials, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, punctuation, and neatness. Additional rules and guidelines can be found by contacting your local DAR chapter.

A winner will be selected from each of the four grades to advance to the state level. The state winner from each grade will advance to the divisional levels, and divisional winners advance to the national level where the winners are announced. All national winners will receive a certificate, medal, and a monetary reward.

Junior American Citizens (JAC)

The JAC is a committee dedicated to promoting good citizenship and appreciation of American heritage and history among every school-age child in the United States. The JAC Committee offers contests in art, creative expression, and community service for grades one to twelve. Preschoolers may participate in the banner and group community services divisions only. Entries are judged by grade on three levels (gifted, general, and special needs) so that every child may enter the contest regardless of ability.

DAR Good Citizens Program

The DAR Good Citizens program and scholarship contest is intended to encourage and reward the qualities of good citizenship. The program is open to all senior class students enrolled in accredited public or private secondary schools that are in good standing with their state boards of education. United States citizenship is not required. The student selected as the school's DAR Good Citizen must have the qualities of dependability (which includes truthfulness, loyalty, and punctuality); service (which includes cooperation, courtesy, and consideration of others); leadership (which includes personality, self-control, and ability to assume responsibility); and patriotism (which includes unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation) to an outstanding degree.

American Indians Committee

The American Indians Committee awards scholarships to Native Americans. This award is intended to help Native American college and technical school students of any age, any tribe, in any state striving to obtain an education. All awards are judged based on financial need and academic achievement. Applicants must be enrolled members of a Native American tribe recognized at the federal or state level. In addition, applicants must be in financial need and have a grade point average of at least 3.25 based on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent.

Programs may be vocational training or college/university at the undergraduate or graduate level. Graduate students are eligible.

The SAR Historical Oration contest promotes the development of high school students as well as the study of American history. The contest is open to all students attending high school (grades 9-12) as well as public, private, parochial, charter, or home schools in that same grade range. While the preliminary rounds of the contest begin at the local level, students may eventually advance to the state or national levels, eventually held at the annual SAR Congress.

Students prepare and present a five- to six-minute speech discussing an event, personality, or document pertaining to the Revolutionary War and how it relates to America today will be judged based upon its composition, delivery, significance, and historical accuracy and relevance. SAR Americanism Elementary School Poster Contest

The SAR Americanism Poster Contest is open to students in 3rd, 4th, or 5th grade, depending on when the American Revolution is taught in their school system. This includes public, private, parochial, charter and home-schooled students. The contest is also open to members of the C.A.R., Cub Scouts, and Brownies who are in the same grade if their school does not participate. Judging is based upon portrayal of the theme, originality, evidence of research, neatness, artistic merit and creativity. The permanent themes are "Revolutionary War Events" in school years ending in an even number and "Revolutionary War Persons" in school years ending in an odd number.
